garden. Consider whether youngsters can be seen by adults from a patio, deck or the kitchen window. Avoid areas that get direct sun unless large umbrellas or other shading methods are used. It's not necessary to purchase massive or expensive playground equipment, but if you do, be sure the slide and swings are high quality and installed properly in a safe area.

Provide protective surfacing for playsets. Royalton Supply Landscape Center in North Royalton sells rubber mulch in several colors made from recycled ground-up tires. A base of at least six inches provides a bouncy landing under playground equipment or tree houses. The company also sells organic landscape materials, including top soils and fertilizers, that create safer yards for kids, according to company representative Lindsey Whited.

own. Sand and water play are other classics that can't be beat, she believes.
